What is the Avon and Wiltshire Positive Behaviour Support Network?

The Avon & Wiltshire Positive Behaviour Support Network is a network of organisations from across the Avon & Wiltshire area, co-ordinated by a voluntary Steering Group of multi-disciplinary/multi agency members and as such is not accountable to any organisation. Thus, rather than setting objectives we work to our terms of reference.

We are committed to promoting and developing PBS as a framework across health & social care providers, facilitating free monthly events to increase the understanding of PBS and develop networks of support. We also organise a free bi-annual conference.

The Network has always functioned on face-to-face contact and the University of the West of England provides the facilities to deliver monthly events. Our Facebook Page enables us to promote events and share up to date guidance and useful information from any source.

Since September 2021 and following the COVID pandemic, we have been able to continue to provide face to face sessions, at UWE, as well as being able to stream them through our Facebook page which has enabled us to reach more people on our contact list.

Biannual PBS conference 2022:

- We opened the conference with a tribute to our former network member Jan Seamer who passed away in 2022, Jan advocated on behalf of all family members and was instrumental in the development of our network.
- We invited four keynote speakers, this included Craig P (person with lived experience), Steve Strong (Independent Supporter), Professor Edwin Jones (PBS strategic lead BILD) and Marie Lovell (Skills for Care).
- Craig spoke at our last conference about his life leaving hospital after 11 years and having his own flat. At this conference, he shared how life has been in terms of the successes and areas where it hasn't been so easy. We talked about how the PBS framework has helped.
- Professor Edwin Jones introduced us to BILD's "What does Good PBS look like" tool which was officially launched at the BILD conference in June 2022, the tool provides organisations with a baseline to where they are in delivering good PBS.

- Marie Lovell from Skills for Care shared information about the PBS Peer Review they are facilitating, this offers the opportunity for individuals to both be the reviewer and reviewee of PBS training across organisations, if you are interested in joining the peer review please contact Marie or Carl Laverick at Skills for Care - <u>mailings@skillsforcare.org.uk</u>
- In the afternoon we delivered four workshops, these included risk management, the importance of advocacy, involving individuals in their PBS plans and PBS competencies.

We collected 43 **feedback forms** from the conference.

- 41.9% stated that the presentation given by Craig was the most impactful.
- 30.2% state that the presentation given by Professor Edwin Jones was the most impactful.
- Participants highlighted some topics they would like to see covered at the next conference e.g., ADHD, Autism, staff experience of initial engagement to completion of competencies, understanding triggers, restraint reduction information, more information from experts by experience, effective communication, and relationships/sexuality.

How do People Know About Events?

The total number of people reached for the whole of 2022 was 1456.

The total number of people reached from January 2022 - June 2023 (that we know of) = **2069**.

We have a mailing list of 185 people who have given their email address.

How Many People Attend Events?

Attendance levels have gradually increased with the average of 20 attending a faceto-face session, although one topical session related to ADHD attracted more than 40 people.

Reflections on 2022/2023

• The network has continued to expand (if requests to be added to our contact list and Facebook followers are used as measures).

- Over the last year the network has re-established sessions held at UWE and gradually our face-to-face numbers have increased.
- Our new steering group members are integral to the longevity of the network.
- We continue to be very grateful that our numbers attending events in person have recovered after the pandemic, we have had 20 to 30 attendees which has generated much discussion and learning which contrasts greatly with our experience of providing sessions via Zoom.
- We have noticed we are seeing new people attending, often from smaller organisations.
- We wondered if people are actively choosing which session to attend in accordance with their interests and responsibilities as we are seeing different people attending sessions, this also demonstrates we are offering a wide range of topics.
- Our biggest challenge is succession planning, this is a regular topic of discussion, the need to attract more people to be part of the Steering Group with the intention of taking the lead and becoming more active.
- We thank the University of the West of England (UWE) for allowing us to use rooms within their Glenside Campus, we wonder whether though, UWE, are missing the opportunity to promote the monthly sessions as a resource for their students.

Plans for 2023/2024

- To encourage new speakers to lead sessions.
- We will continue to livestream our sessions on Facebook and collect data retrospectively. By doing this we hope to maintain the relationships we have formed with other PBS networks and practitioners from outside the of the local area.
- To arrange an Annual Conference June 2024.
